No. 220. THE PUBLIC HEALTH (VILLAGES) LAWS, 1936 TO 1943.

No. 222. THE WAR LOAN LAW, 1943.

REGULATIONS MADE UNDER SECTION 21.

I, the Governor in Council, in exercise of the powers conferred by section 21 of the War Loan Law, 1943, do hereby make the following regulations:—

1. These regulations may be cited as the War Loan Regulations, 1944, and shall be read as one with the War Loan Regulations, 1943, (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Regulations"), and the principal Regulations and these regulations may together be cited as the War Loan Regulations, 1943 and 1944.

2. Regulation 10 of the principal Regulations is hereby amended as follows:—

(a) by the insertion immediately after the words "at the following prices" (line 3) of the following words "including premia,";

(b) by the deletion in the proviso thereto of the word "prices" and the substitution therefor of the word "premia".

3. These regulations shall be deemed to have come into operation on the 19th day of July, 1943.

No. 223. THE AGRICULTURAL PRODUCE (EXPORT) LAW, 1933.

REGULATIONS MADE UNDER SECTION 8.

Governor.

I, the Governor in Council, in exercise of the powers conferred by section 8 of the Agricultural Produce (Export) Law, 1933, do hereby make the following regulations:-

1. These regulations may be cited as the Agricultural Produce (Dried Figs) Export Regulations, 1944, and shall come into force on the 1st day of July, 1944.

2. In these regulations—

"dried figs" means the dried fruit of the plant *Ficus carica*;

"Law" means the Agricultural Produce (Export) Law, 1933;

"inspector" means the produce inspector for the place of inspection at which the dried figs intended for export are submitted for examination.

3.—(1) No dried figs shall be exported unless they have been examined and passed by the inspector as fit for export and no dried figs shall be passed as fit for export unless such dried figs—

(a) are packed in new boxes of a size of 45 × 38 × 14 cms. or 37 × 25 × 13 cms., which are planed inside and outside and are covered inside with grease paper or other similar paper;

(b) are properly pressed and packed in rows;

(c) are of the same variety and prepared in the same manner in any one box;

(d) are properly sorted and contain—

(i) not more than 10 per centum split figs;

(ii) no black figs, commonly known as "maxiles";

(iii) no oiled figs, that is to say, figs treated with oil to encourage maturity;

(iv) not more than 3 per centum figs which are mechanically damaged;

(e) are free from mould and extraneous matter;

(f) are free from insect pests or diseases;

(g) contain not more than 27 per centum moisture;

Provided that the Director of Agriculture, if satisfied that the provisions of sub-paragraph (a) of this paragraph cannot be complied with owing to shortage of the materials required therefor, may permit by writing under his hand the use of such other kind of boxes or paper as to him may seem fit:

Provided further that dried figs which do not comply with sub-paragraph (d) (i) of this paragraph may be passed as fit for export if specially packed by splitting them open and pressing each two figs together.

(2) Sub-paragraph (a) of paragraph (1) of this regulation shall not apply to any boxes exported on or before the 31st day of December, 1944, but such boxes shall be new boxes which are planed outside and are covered inside with grease paper or other similar paper.

4. Dried figs of the same variety may be packed in small packets of cellophane or other similar paper but such packets shall be packed in boxes of the kind prescribed by regulation 3 and the number of such packets shall be clearly marked on such boxes.

5. Every box containing dried figs for export shall be marked with the words "PRODUCE OF CYPRUS", with the mark of the consignor and consignee and with its destination and no such box shall be exported unless it is so marked.

6.—(1) Any person who intends to export any dried figs shall give notice to the inspector at the place of exportation, stating the quantity of dried figs to be shipped and the destination of the consignment and shall present the same for examination. Such notice shall be given and the consignment shall be presented for examination
