NOTICE UNDER SECTION 12.

In exercise of the powers vested in me by section 12 of the Sheep and Goats (Shepherds' Licensing and Control) Law, I hereby direct that during the period between the 11th September, 1953, and the 30th November, 1953, flocks within the areas of Pano Lefkara, Tokhni and Kalavasos, in the District of Larnaca, shall, between the hours of sunset and sunrise, be kept inside an enclosure and not taken outside an enclosure:

Provided that nothing in this notice contained shall prevent the driving of any flock, under the proper charge of a licensed shepherd, from one

village area to another, along any public road, at any hour.

No. 438. THE AGRICULTURAL PRODUCE EXPORT REGULATIONS, 1953.

Notice under Regulation 14 (b).

In exercise of the powers vested in me by regulation 14 (b) of the Agricultural Produce Export Regulations, 1953, I, the Director of Agriculture,

hereby direct that until further notice-

1. Pomegranates intended for export to the United Kingdom, or any other European market, should be packed in new strong wooden cases or crates of a size and construction approved by the Produce Inspector. Pomegranates packed in each container should be of a uniform size and well protected with woodwool.

2. Pomegranates intended for export to countries other than European

ones should be packed in one of the following manners:-

(a) In new strong paperlined baskets of a size approved by the Produce Inspector. The contents must not exceed 20 okes (56 lb.) net. The pomegranates should be well protected with woodwool at the

(b) In new wooden cases or crates in accordance with the provisions governing the packing of pomegranates to European countries,

(see section 1 above).

3. Pomegranates intended for export to Mediterranean ports may be packed in one of the following manners:

(a) In new strong wooden cases or crates in accordance with the provisions governing the packing of pomegranates to European Countries,

(see section 1 above);

(b) In new strong paperlined baskets of a size approved by the Produce Inspector, the contents of which must not exceed 40 okes (112 lb.) net. The pomegranates should be well protected with woodwool at the top;

(c) In bulk, provided, the written permission of the Produce Inspector

at the port of loading is granted to the exporter.
