THE DEFENCE (IMPORTATION OF GOODS) REGULATIONS,
1943 TO 1953.

OPEN GENERAL IMPORT LICENCE No. 62000.

In exercise of the powers vested in me by virtue of the Defence (Importation of Goods) Regulations, 1943 to 1953, I hereby grant to any importer registered under the provisions of the Defence (Control of Sale Prices of Imported Articles) Orders, 1943 to (No. 2) 1949, an Open General Import Licence under No. 62000 to import into the Colony in any quantity any goods originating in the United Kingdom or any other British Colony if such goods are imported into the Colony either directly from their countries of origin or through the United Kingdom or any other British Colony :

Provided that no goods enumerated in the Schedule hereto or originating or supplied from any other territories shall be imported under this licence :

Provided further that in all cases covered by this licence payment shall be made in sterling.

2. This Open General Import Licence is deemed to be a written licence issued by me under regulation 2 (1) (a) of the Defence (Importation of Goods) Regulations, 1943 to 1953, and is subject to the provisions of regulation 2 (1) (b) of the said Regulations.

The Open General Import Licence No. 172801 published under Notification No. 96 in Supplement No. 3 to the *Gazette* of 16th March, 1950, as amended by Notifications No. 248 in Supplement No. 3 to the *Gazette* of 6th July, 1950, No. 283 in Supplement No. 3 to the *Gazette* of 4th June, 1953, and No. 352 in Supplement No. 3 to the *Gazette* of 23rd July, 1953, is hereby cancelled without prejudice to anything done or left undone thereunder.

SCHEDULE.

1. Arms, ammunition and explosives.
2. Coffee.
3. Wheat, wheat flour and barley.
4. Fruit juices.
5. Gold and Silver.
6. Knitted woollen garments made of mohair, camel-hair, llama or vicuna.
7. Manufactured tobacco ; cigarettes, pipe tobacco.
8. Rice, whole and broken.
9. Sugar.
10. Tin bars and ingots and tin plate.
11. Sulphate of Ammonia.
